#### **Administering Communion**

As you approach the altar, please gel your hands.

Move to either side of the altar where you will be offered the consecrated bread. You can then continue on to receive the consecrated wine from the shared chalice or limit your Communion to bread alone. Please remember that Communion in one kind still constitutes full reception.

Please DO NOT dip your bread into the chalice. This is not recommended on fairly obvious health grounds.

If you wish to receive a blessing rather than Communion, please take your service sheet with you.

Return to your seat via the side aisles as usual.

If you would like gluten free bread at Communion, please just ask.

This important day, which marks the beginning of Lent, falls on Wednesday this week. There will be a Said Eucharist in St John's at 10.30am and a Choral Eucharist in St Peter's at 7.30pm. Both will include the imposition of ashes.
